
Mastering Physics 2.3 - Universal Law of Gravitation

1. A cannon is fired from the top of a cliff as shown in the figure. Ignore drag (air friction) for this question. Take H as the height of the cliff.

What is the magnitude of the gravitational force acting on the earth due to the sun?

$$Fg = \frac{Gm_1 m_2}{r^2} = \frac{(6.67 \times 10^{-11})(5.98 \times 10^{24})(1.99 \times 10^{30})}{(1.5 \times 10^{11})^2} = \frac{[3.53 \times 10^{22}]}{[3.53 \times 10^{22}]}$$

b. At the moment shown in the figure of the earth and sun The figure represents the Earth, moving along the dashed line of its circular orbit around the sun., what is the direction of the gravitational force acting on the earth?

- What is the magnitude of the gravitational force acting on the sun due to the earth?
 - The earth does not exert any gravitational force on the sun.
 - The earth exerts some force on the sun, but less than 3.53×10^{22} N because the earth, which is exerting the force, is so much less massive than the sun.
 - The earth exerts 3.53×10^{22} N of force on the sun, exactly the same amount of force the sun exerts on the earth found in Part A.
 - The earth exerts more than 3.53×10^{22} N of force on the sun because the sun, which is experiencing the force, is so much more massive than the earth.
- Which of the following changes to the earth-sun system would reduce the magnitude of the force between them to one-fourth the value found in Part A?
 - Reduce the mass of the earth to one-fourth its normal value.

 - The radius of the earth is 6.38×10^6 m.


